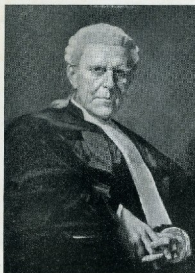

About The Boys' Brigade.

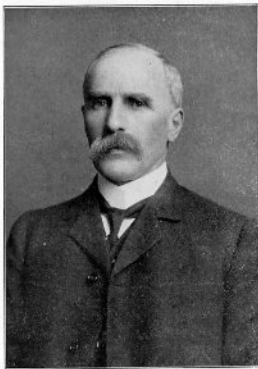


THE BOYS' BRIGADE was founded in Glasgow in 1883 by Sir William A. Smith. From a small beginning of 30 Boys the movement has grown into a world-wide organisation numbering 110,000 Boys, of whom 70,000 are in the United Kingdom.

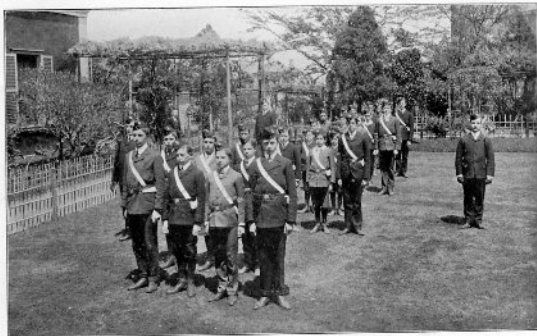
To quote from the Constitution the object of the Brigade is "the advancement of Christ's Kingdom among Boys, and the promotion of habits of obedience, reverence, discipline, self-respect, and all that tends towards a true Christian manliness."

The object is attained by using military organisation and drill as a means of attracting, training, and disciplining the Boys; by direct religious instruction in the Bible Class; by occupying the Boys' spare time with useful and elevating pursuits, and surrounding them with a healthy moral atmosphere.

While the Weekly Drill Meeting and the Bible Class are the two distinguishing features of the work, attention is also given to Gymnastics, Ambulance Work, Instrumental Music, Athletics, Scouting, Swimming, and Summer Camps.

6,500 Officers,

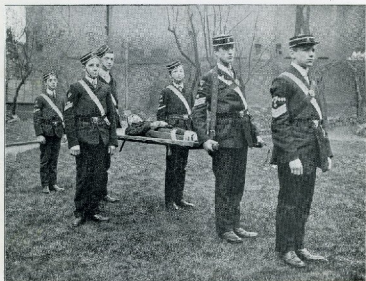
70,000 Boys.
